Dear Parents, Guardians and Students

Also, a big thank you to Julie Ryan, who has taught the 'dance moves' to thousands of our debutantes for the past 25 years and, as on these two Saturday evenings, presented them in spectacular fashion.

One of our quiet achievers at the College is Year 10 student, Mayson Hoverd. Mayson is an outstanding young person and athlete who has been chosen in the Under 16 Victorian School Boys Rugby Union Team and will be touring with the team to Ireland, Scotland, England, Wales, Belgium and France for four weeks later in the year. Mayson has been playing Rugby Union since the age of 8 for the Eltham Rugby Club and he has been one of their stand-out players for a number of years. I am certain that Mayson has an outstanding

Rugby career ahead of him and we congratulate him on his outstanding achievements.

Students and parents would be now well aware of the fire damage sustained by the College in the arson attack that occurred in the early hours of the morning on Friday 25th September. The G Block English Office was broken into and set on fire and it has been destroyed, as has the adjoining computer pod and Room G14. Rooms G8, G10 and G11 were also fire and water damaged and the whole wing, which includes eight classrooms, the Science Store and Prep room and three teacher offices are out of action and locked down.

The suspected arsonist was arrested and held in remand since the day of the attack, an attack that was random and not related in any way to the College or anyone in our school community whatsoever. Since the fire our Principal Team and staff have worked around the clock with teams of people and contractors from numerous authorities to assess,

contain and clear out the damage. We are extremely pleased that the College was open on the first day of Term 4 for classes to operate as normal. We have had to make some emergency arrangements which have included procuring and installing four new Science relocatable classrooms and a new Science Prep room, adjacent to A Block, on the river side of the College. We also have two brand new General Purpose classrooms at the end of A Block. The staff in the English office has been relocated to other offices as has the staff in our Maths and Science offices.

I would really like to thank and commend our six members of staff: Caitlin Penrose, Kate Webb, Kerryn Murray, Jacob Bloom, Cathy Dunstan and Gareth Young, who lost all of their own teaching resources and many personal and professional items in the fire. They have all resumed their normal teaching duties at the College and are doing a great job in adverse circumstances.

I would also like to acknowledge our Local Member of Parliament, Vicki Ward, and also the Minister for Education, James Merlino, for their contact and efforts to support us in this unfortunate event. They have both responded with a high level of concern and genuine support for our College community. One very positive outcome is that our permanent building redevelopment program looks like being fast tracked by the Department of Education and Training

in response to this event and we have already held initial meetings with architects and project managers.

A special request to parents: Can you please let me, or the General Office know, if your child has been selected or chosen at State or National level, for any personal or team achievement, whether it be academic, artistic or sporting. We would like to establish a register of high achievement and to acknowledge these students in some way consistent with our College motto of 'Pride in Achievement'.

SNAKE ALERT

An urgent and important reminder to all students who travel to and from school using the Plenty River path or the sports ovals that they need to be aware tiger snakes are usually active at this time of the year, and that for the last six years they have been very aggressive during hot weather. Environmental experts predict that snake sightings will become more prevalent this year. I have spoken to a field officer from the City of Banyule, and he said that short bursts of warm weather and sunshine resulted in snakes emerging from the scrub near the river and sunning themselves on paths and concrete surfaces. We have also had some Council warning signs installed near the river paths warning pedestrians to "Beware of Snakes".

In February some six years ago one of our own students was bitten by a snake while walking near the river path at Simms Road Oval, and he spent a considerable amount of time in hospital. There are now warning signs along the path but all students and pedestrians need to exercise extreme caution when travelling to and from school along the river tracks. It is comforting to know that we have a great network of neighbours and pedestrians who use the river path and if there are any sightings of snakes they let the College know immediately.


