



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

On the first day of Term 2, our Year 12 Legal Studies class and their teacher, Rebecca Culnane, were paid a visit by The Honorable Jenny Macklin, MP, Federal Member for Jagajaga and Shadow Minister for Families and Social Services. Jenny joined the class and gave a very insightful presentation on the development and review of constitutional law and law reforms. She also answered student's questions on the operations of Parliament. This was a very helpful visit for our students as in the following lessons they were to complete a SAC on constitutional law.

Jenny is the longest serving female Federal Parliamentarian in Australia and has been a great supporter of our College for many years.

In the last week of Term 1, we held our annual Student Progress Interview Days. This is the opportunity for parents and guardians to receive valuable feedback on the progress of their child's learning and school experience. This year we trialled the running on this event over two days and evenings, affording parents and teachers more time to discuss any relevant issues, concerns and learning strategies.

On Wednesday 15th March we held our 17th successive annual House Athletics Carnival at Willinda Park. The weather was

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good, but particularly hot. However, this did not deter our students and again we witnessed some amazing and creative costumes in House colours. Our students were highly competitive in most events and a lot of impressive teamwork and individual athletic talent was on display. Congratulations to all staff and students involved and a special thank you to Sports co-ordinator, Bruce Collins, who put in many hours of work on the day and in preparation to make it so cohesive. Also, a big thank you to the parents who attended to support this event and congratulations to Yarra House for their victory.

On Saturday 25th and Sunday 26th March our College celebrated its eighth year of involvement in the Cancer Council's *Relay for Life* community fundraising event. Our Montmorency Secondary College team had 180 active participants, and, at the end of the weekend, had raised more than \$7,600. Our student leaders and community were led by Leading Teacher, Kim Faulkner, who organised an impressive and committed team. Kim, together with student leaders, were responsible for leading this great effort, which resulted in achieving a 'research award' in our College name.

This year we have also asked for the award to be named and to honour the memory of former College parent, Robyn Jeffs, who sadly passed away last year. Robyn, the mother of Nick and Tom, was a great supporter of and advocate for our College. In 2016 Tom was the student leader who organised our highly successful team and fund raising efforts in *Relay for Life* and this is a very appropriate accolade for the Jeffs family. This year twenty of our senior students stayed overnight to ensure we were represented on the track at all times. As special thank you to staff members, Bronwyn Mackey, Michelle Clark, Deb Metcalfe, Kate Webb and Kerryn Robinson, who stayed during the night to supervise team members.

On ANZAC Day our College was very well represented by our students and staff at the Montmorency RSL commemorative service. More than 100 of our students, their parents and College staff paid their respects and attended the Montmorency March and Ceremony held at the Montmorency RSL in Petrie Park. At the ceremony, three of our College Captains, Ben McCluskey, Ruby Panozzo and Taleah Scopel presented and laid a wreath on behalf of the College. Impressively, Chloe Giles, was part of the ceremony and spoke to the audience of several thousand on 'The Meaning of ANZAC' and three of our Middle School Leaders, Cooper Houghton, Macy Houghton and Jack Penrose read the requiem.

Once again our SRC was well represented on the good Friday Appeal telecast. Five of our student leaders, (Ben McCluskey, Michaela Fernando, Jack Penrose, Cooper Houghton and Macy Houghton) were interviewed and presented a cheque for \$2,004.90, which had been raised for the Appeal from two casual clothes days, a scavenger hunt and a basketball competition.

On Monday 24th April our student leaders held another highly impressive Whole School Assembly. Highlights included a wonderful speech and presentation by our year 12 French exchange student, Maeva Verlihiac, who I believe won the hearts and admiration of all students and staff with her emotional and insightful reflections on her time at the College and the Monty culture she has enjoyed so much. Year 12 student, Grace Millers, also spoke of her exchange experience last year in Japan. Our special guest speaker at the assembly, Lisa Candia, was introduced by Sarah van Putten and Bronson Hill as a part of their Year 9 Endeavour Studies. Lisa is a volunteer from the *Share the Dignity* social justice project and she was very well received by our students. Also featured at the assembly were a report and presentations on the House Athletics, the Good Friday Royal Children's Hospital Appeal and the Breast Cancer Network of Australia fundraisers. The Assembly concluded with a wonderful presentation by Year 11 student, Chloe Giles, on what ANZAC Day means to her. Finally, teacher, Campbell Wilson, played the bagpipes and the requiem to respectfully end the assembly.

I would like to congratulate our Year 7 and Year 10 Student Leaders and also Junior School Leader, Sonia Culcasi for another inspirational annual 'Thinking Carnival' on Thursday 23rd March. More than 120 students from Lower Plenty, Sherbourne and Greensborough Primary Schools were involved. The teamwork, problem solving and creative thinking achieved by the students in their groups on the day was outstanding and vindicated the planning, hard work and efforts of all concerned. Impressively, we had 31 of our Year 7 and 21 of our Year 10 Student Leaders who facilitated the day under the guidance of our staff.

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On Tuesday 2nd May, we held our annual Open Day/Evening to showcase what Montmorency has to offer prospective students and families enrolling at the College. This proved to be a somewhat challenging, yet very exciting event this year due to our 'building site status' and I believe even more families were in attendance this year to inspect the College. We had an audience of 330 in the afternoon session followed by 350 plus in the evening. Our students and staff were superb ambassadors and the faculty displays and information provided was again highly impressive. All staff and our student leaders, speakers and helpers were true ambassadors and were informative and confident young individuals who displayed true commitment and leadership qualities. Once again, the success of our Open Day is also predicated on many hours of planning and commitment from all staff and 'Pride in Achievement' was certainly on display in abundance.

This term we have experienced a number of staffing changes brought about mainly by teachers taking Long Service Leave. Mary Curran, who is also our Year 10 Level Co-ordinator, is on leave this term and she has been replaced by Kathleen Fogarty, who has also previously worked at the College. Teacher, Tania Harle, is also on leave and she has been replaced by Anna Sangmeister. Junior School Leader, Sonia Culcasi, is also on leave and has been replaced by Alecia Kelly. For the first three weeks of this term, Year 7 Level Co-ordinator, Natalie McDonnell, was replaced by Tess Haycraft. Bronwyn Mackey, our Senior School Leader is also on leave for three weeks and has been replaced by Jill Hillier. Louise Valentini has also joined our staff as the new AV/Library Technician.

A number of our staff on leave have defined positions of responsibility and leadership roles within the College. In terms of our distributed leadership model this has created leadership opportunities for other teachers. Therefore, Belinda Bell has stepped into Year 10 Coordination, Gemma Seymour into Year 7 Coordination and Grant Dowler has taken on the head of Junior School role.

SWIMMING NEWS

Northern Metropolitan Finals

The Northern Metropolitan Swimming Finals were held at WaterMarc last term on the 29th March. Three students progressed to the State Schools Victoria State Championships in seven events, which was held Wednesday 26th April, 2017 at MSAC. The results were as follows:

- ◇ **Josh Allison 7B (50m Free & 200 IM),**
- ◇ **Tara Kinder (50m Free, 200 IM & 50 Breast stroke), and**
- ◇ **Jamie Kuhn (100m Breast stroke & 50m Breast stroke).**

Four new NMR Competition records were set by our students:

- ◇ **Josh Allison 13y 50m Free in 28.08s slicing a gigantic 0.86s off the previous record of 28.94s,**
- ◇ **Tara Kinder 14y 50m Free in 29.25s taking 0.45s off the previous record of 29.70s,**
- ◇ **Tara Kinder 15y 200m IM in 2:30.67s taking 1.90s off the previous record of 2:32.57s,**
- ◇ **Ryan Leaper 16y 50m Butterfly in 28.88 taking 0.2s off the previous record of 29.08s.**

Several of these swims were in combined age groups against older students so each of these swimmers can expect continued success as they mature through the age groups in future competitions.

We can look forward to future successes for Josh as he in turn becomes one of the older boys in the combined age groups.

→ **Jamie Kuhn** competed in two events at the SSV State Championships achieving 4th in the 18-20 year 50m Breaststroke, missing a third place by 0.2s (about 15cm), and 7th in the 12-20 year 100m Breaststroke. Jamie also competed in the Tasmanian State Championships, qualifying to compete in ten events, and achieving a third place in the Open 200m Individual Medley. Jamie has represented Monty at SSV State Champs in both individual and relay events for several years achieving high distinction on each occasion. Completing year 12, this will be Jamie's last year at Monty and we wish him well in both his sport and his future studies.

Thank you Jamie for being a great team leader and for all of the successes you have brought to our school.



↓ **Tara Kinder** competed in and won three events at the SSV State Championships: 14 year 50m Breaststroke, 14 year Freestyle, and 12-15 year 200m Individual Medley. Backing up her State titles from last year, Tara has achieved the amazing result of triple State Champion. Tara also competed in the Age Nationals at Brisbane where she qualified to swim in five finals against the best swimmers in Australia in her age group. Tara came second in the 200m Breaststroke and third in each of the 200m Individual Medley and the 400m Breaststroke, 4th in the 100m Breaststroke and 10th in the 50m Freestyle. These are fabulous results to be truly proud of.

Congratulations to each of Josh, Jamie and Tara for achieving the high distinction of swimming in a State Championship final. Special congratulations to Tara for earning three State titles. Each of these students has trained hard for years to now be ranked amongst the

best swimmers in the state and the nation .
