FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians & Students,

In our last Newsletter, I informed our College community about the new Department of Education and Training guidelines to elect two new student representatives onto the College Council. All students from Years 7 to 12 are eligible to stand for election and I have spoken to each year level of students, explaining the details of the election process. All students have one week to either self-nominate, or to be nominated by another student, for these positions, from Monday 4th June until the close of nominations at 4.00pm on Tuesday 12th June, 2018. Voting papers and candidate statements will then be available to all students for one week from Tuesday 19th June, 2018.

We have some very exciting news about our Intermediate Girls Softball team. After winning the Regional finals in April, our 12 girls went through to the State Finals at Gells Park, Wheelers Hill, on Thursday 31st May. They became State Champions after winning the Grand Final by one run. Coached by our Physical Education Faculty Leader, Samantha Shelton, the team has trained together since Year 7 and have been runners-up in the State Finals in Year 7 and Year 8. Congratulations to all the team members on this outstanding achievement.

On Friday 25th May, we held our annual cross-country run on a local course around the College and luckily, the weather was very kind to the students. Organised by teacher, Jacob Bloom, there were over 100 students involved. There were some very impressive times recorded and we look forward to the next level of competition for those students winning their age groups.

The NAPLAN testing for Year 7 and Year 9 students was conducted in Week 5 of the term and this week also saw our Year 10 students undertake the Work Experience program held by the College. This program has been overseen by our Work Experience Co-ordinator, Bronwyn Mackey, Careers and Pathways Co-ordinator, John Hallsworth and Senior School Assistant, Leora Levacic, who have all played important roles in directing students through this process. It has been a most beneficial experience as it helps to inform students as to their work and career choices in the future. The experience not only helps to identify and work on their employability skills, it also helps to direct their course of study undertaken to achieve each individual student's career and study goals. The process now sees each of our Year 10 students counselled at the College level into their career pathways and each student now develops a career action plan.

In Week 7 of this term, we held two Year 8 activity camps at Billabong Ranch in Echuca. This was a very successful and enjoyable experience attended by most of our Year 8 students, along with their Year Level Co-ordinators and Home Group teachers. Most of the activities, including animal care, horse riding, orienteering, commando courses, bush first aid, paddle boats, a bonfire, marshmallow toasting and whip cracking, were conducted at the ranch.

It is pleasing to report that our annual mid-year Music concert, held on the evening of Monday 21st May, was once again a great success. The students were well-supported by parents, family members and friends in our Auditorium. We were all very impressed by the variety and quality of the musical talent of the performers and how they are progressing. Our bands, ensembles, choir, and individual performances, entertained the large audience and the growth and development of the program continues. Congratulations to all our Music students and a special acknowledgement to our Team of Instrumental Music Teachers for their dedication to our students and the program. Our team is led by Instrumental Music Director, Anthony Citino (Percussion and Bass) and includes Sharon Cooke (Strings), Cheryl Cook (Woodwind), Ken Gardiner (Brass), Tania Grimshaw (Vocals), Joanne Siegersma (Piano) and Nick Constanos (Guitar).

On Tuesday, 22nd May, 45 of our Year 8 and 9 boys from the SRC Leadership program participated in an all-day event at Peninsula Obstacle Racing Course on the Mornington Peninsula, overseen by teachers, Hamish Yule and Kim Faulkner. They were thrown into a 'tough muddler' style of obstacle course challenge that required a lot of teamwork, communication and resilience to complete. Congratulations to these students on completing the course and, from all accounts, it was a very worthwhile experience.

Also on Thursday 22nd May, our Careers and Pathways Co-ordinator, John Hallsworth, presented the first of two parent career information sessions for our Year 9 students. Known as EPIC (Engaging Parents in Career Conversations), the sessions run for two hours in the main staffroom on a Wednesday evening. Twenty-five families were involved in the first session, which basically clarifies terminology, acronyms and possible pathways, helping parents to assist their students with a career action plan.

On Friday 1st June, I was lucky enough to attend an excellent performance by our VCE Theatre Studies class, the play *Blackrock* written by Nick Enright. Performed to a large audience of students, families, friends and teachers in our Auditorium, the students certainly achieved a very high standard of theatrical interpretation. Well done to the cast and their teacher and director, Jason Mill, for such an outstanding performance.

In a little theatre in Melbourne's CBD, Jean Tong's play *Hungry Ghosts* tackles recent events with worldwide consequences. Crossing between the incidents and aftermath of the missing flight MH370 and Malaysia's 1MDB scandal, the play examines loss, home and self-identity through three nameless characters. In particular, the play follows number 2 who, as a young, queer Chinese-Malaysian Australian, aims to understand where she stands in the world following these events.

In this play, I particularly enjoyed the set and lighting design. The lighting, bright white beams contrasting to the dark set and performance space, was eerily intriguing. Additionally, the use of moveable set pieces, resembling an aeroplane, a submarine, even the body of a whale, created smooth and mesmerising transitions between storylines. The actors' confidence in their movement in and around the set allowed the audience to imagine exactly what the actors were seeing.

One of the joys of theatre is that each and every audience member, with different perspectives, opinions and identities, understands every performance of every play differently. With a minimal set, non-linear plot line and fluctuating character roles, *Hungry Ghosts* takes personal interpretation of a play to a whole new level. By allowing the audience the opportunity to completely imagine the world of the play while also drawing on their own knowledge and perspective of the events of MH370 and the 1MDB, Jean Tong ensures that, while there are, of course, the given points to laugh at and moments to hold your breath, everyone will take something different away from this moving production.

Visit the Synchrotron with us

The Royal Society Victoria are hosting a behind the scene tour of the Australian Synchrotron in Clayton. Synchrotrons use electricity to produce intense beams of light a million times brighter than the sun. The light is produced when high-energy electrons are forced to travel in a circular orbit inside the



synchrotron tunnels by 'synchronised' application of strong magnetic fields. The electron beams travel at just under the speed of light – about 299,792 kilometres per second. The intense light they produce is filtered and adjusted to travel into experimental workstations, where the light reveals the innermost, sub-microscopic secrets of materials under investigation, from human tissue to plants to metals and more.


With this new knowledge that synchrotron science provides about the molecular structure of materials, researchers can invent ways to tackle diseases, make plants more productive and metals more resilient – among many other beneficial applications of synchrotron science.
