FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

In 2013 our community was rocked by the tragic Swanston Street Wall crash which took the lives of three young people. Two of the three were former Montmorency Secondary College students, brother and sister Alexander and Bridget Jones, both brilliant students and amazing young people who were widely known and loved throughout our community. In their honour the Adelaide and Bendigo Bank has created two annual scholarships that are awarded annually to two Montmorency Secondary College students to create special and substantial opportunities for those with a passion and determination to continue their education at Melbourne University. These scholarships are for those graduates from our College who are offered a full time place at the University of Melbourne for the first time and each scholarship lasts for two years and is valued at \$5,000 for each year. I am pleased to announce that the 2019 recipients of the scholarships are Macy Houghton and Nicholas Frost. Macy and Nicholas are also two of our College Captains from 2018 and we congratulate them on these well deserved scholarships and I am sure we will hear more about their educational journey. It is also interesting to note that since 2014, twelve of our students have been awarded these scholarships.

Our College celebrated women and leadership for International Women's Day with a breakfast in our Resource Centre that was run by our Local State Member of Parliament, Vicki Ward, on Friday 8th March. Also attending was our Local Federal Member of Parliament, the Honourable Jenny Macklin and it was inspiring to see a large contingent of our student leaders, students and staff who hold major leadership roles within the College attend and celebrate this important day. Every year at this breakfast, Vicki Ward presents the International Women's Day Pauline Toner Prize, in memory of the wonderful achievements of Pauline Toner. Our nominee this year was Year 12 student, Imogen Pricor who was acknowledged for her work and advocacy on behalf of the LGBTQ+ community. Although, she did not win the prize, Imogen was very highly rated and regarded for her leadership in this area.

As was indicated by Vicki Ward, Pauline Toner was the first female cabinet minister in the Victorian Parliament. As a member of the Labour Party, she was elected to the Victorian Legislative Assembly in 1977, the first woman to represent our area. Pauline became the first female Minister for Community Welfare Services from 1982 to 1985. She worked tirelessly on social justice, gender equality, and protection of the environment. Her work continues to provide a legacy for women and impressively Pauline's granddaughter, Mio Tamura, is currently in Year 8 at our College. It was very fitting that Mio and her mother Madeline attended the breakfast as special guests.

On Tuesday 5th March we again held our annual House Athletics Carnival at Willinda Park. We were very lucky to have good weather and again we witnessed some amazing and creative costumes in House colours. Our students were very competitive in most events and a lot of impressive teamwork and individual athletic effort and talent was on display. Congratulations to all students and staff involved and a special thank you to our Sports Co-ordinator, Bruce Collins, who put in many hours of work on the day and in preparation to make it so successful.



Also on Tuesday 5th March, we held our annual and very informative and well attended Mathematics Information Evening. This was led by Leading Teacher, Steve Horn, whose portfolio is Mathematics and Numeracy in the College. There were two information sessions, and in the first for Years 7 – 9 Steve was joined by Mathematics teachers Mathew Dean and James Atkin in the presentation. The second session focussed on Mathematics for Years 10 – 12 students. In the two sessions there were some very insightful presentations outlining support structures for students and teaching and learning practices in Mathematics.

On Wednesday 13th February a special Badge Presentation Ceremony was held in the College Auditorium. The assembly was conducted by our four College Captains and was also attended by a number of parents, grandparents and staff. The achievements of 67 student leaders were acknowledged and badges were presented to Middle School Captains, Middle School Leaders, Senior Leaders, and also Senior and Middle School House Captains. Former students and student leaders Daniel Hickey and Ruby Panozzo addressed the group and spoke about their own motivation and experiences as student leaders.

In weeks four and five of this term, we have held 3 Year 7 three day camps. Eight Year 7 classes, together with their Home Group teachers and level co-ordinators, attended the Angahook Camp at Aireys Inlet and were involved in many team building and bonding activities, which included mountain bike riding, surfing and raft building. It also afforded students the opportunity to make friends with students from other Year 7 classes.

This term we have held two impressive whole school assemblies, the first on Monday 11th February, and the second on Friday 8th March. We have only just managed to arrange enough seating for our 1079 students plus our staff and guests on each occasion. Again our student leaders under the expert guidance of Leading Teacher, Kim Faulkner, have organised and conducted two highly informative, educational and entertaining events.

I would really like to acknowledge the outstanding sporting achievements of Year 8 student, Hannah Scott. Hannah has been selected to represent Australia in the Under 14 Australian Softball Team which will be competing in New Zealand in April. Congratulations Hannah.

Lastly, our Student Progress Interview Days are scheduled for Tuesday 2nd April and Wednesday 3rd April which is in the last week of term. These days are most valuable as they provide parents, guardians and students the opportunity to meet with teachers and discuss student progress in respective subject areas. Progress Interview Days are student free days and students are not required at school for timetabled classes. However, we encourage all students to attend the progress interviews together with their parents or guardians and to make the most of this opportunity.

Included below is some information which may be of assistance if your child has a tooth knocked out (and may help you avoid all those costly dental expenses!)

Knocked-out adult (permanent) teeth

- If an adult or permanent tooth is knocked out:
- Handle the tooth by the crown (smooth white part), not the root (yellowish pointy parts).
- If the tooth is dirty, gently rinse it in milk or saline for a few seconds – not in water.
- Gently put the tooth back into the gum. Make sure the pointy root is the part that goes into the gum. Only do this if the person is conscious.
- Get the person to hold the tooth in place by gently biting on something soft, like a handkerchief.
- Make sure the person sees a dentist immediately.

If you can't put a permanent tooth back:

- Wrap it in plastic food wrap, or put it in milk or saline.
- Make sure the person sees a dentist immediately.

What NOT to do with a knocked-out adult tooth

- Don't clean the tooth by scrubbing or using cleaning products or water.
- Don't handle the tooth by the root.
- Don't let the tooth dry out.

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule

The Child Dental Benefits Schedule provides individual benefits for a range of services including examinations, x-rays, cleaning, fissure sealing, fillings, root canals and extractions. Benefits are not available for orthodontic or cosmetic dental work and cannot be paid for any services provided in a hospital.

Eligible children will have access to a benefit cap of \$1,000 over a two calendar year period.

To be eligible a child must be aged between 2-17 years and their family must receive Family Tax Benefit Part A or a relevant Australian Government payment.

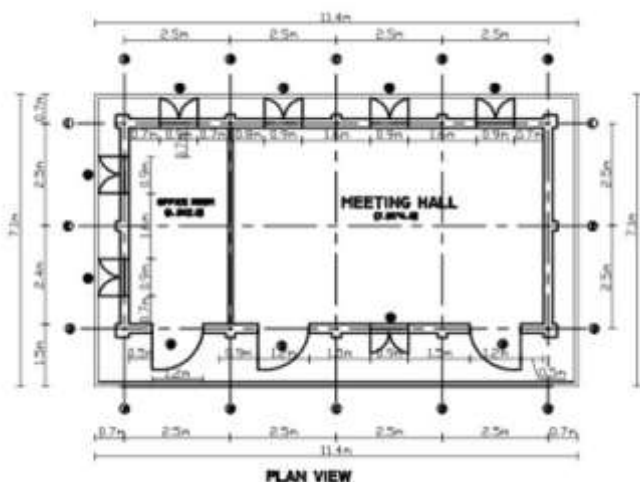

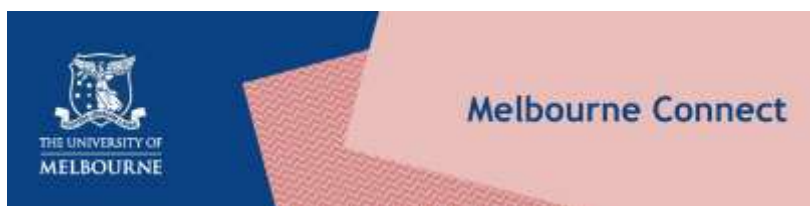
Year 10 Montmorency Secondary Students have been invited to participate in the 2019 Melbourne Connect program hosted by the University of Melbourne.
