FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

Our final term for the year is now well underway and we do have many special events for our students about to take place. The last week of Term 3 was significant for our Science Faculty as it was "Science Week" and our students adopted a STEAM approach to many of the activities on offer. The STEAM skills and theories apply when students have the opportunity to investigate the world around them combining elements of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics. Our Year 7 students were treated to an exciting 'Reptile Encounters' incursion, a hands on experience that was highly educational as well. All Year 7 Science classes also competed in the 'Engineers Without Borders' challenge whereby they had to build a floating house to hold as many marbles as possible. The champions were Rohan Meckiff and Jake Woodward of 7C and their house floated with 109 marbles. In second place was Harry Mariani and Finn Lewis of 7A.

Our Year 8 Science classes embarked on the 'Spinner Challenge'. In class with their Science teachers they had to design, engineer and build a spinning device and the challenge was to achieve the longest descent from a certain height. This was a close competition that required a final 'spin off' as there was an equal best time. The Champions with their device were Billy Loustas and Isaac Illingworth of 8A with a time of 4.33 seconds from a height of 2 metres. In second place with a time of 3.49 seconds were Maddie Venakovic and Tiah Pentacost of 8H.

Our Year 9 students were also treated to 'The Bad Science Show' in our Auditorium which not only entertained them, but helped to unpack some shonky science reporting in the world around us. Well done to our Science Faculty on this highly interesting celebration of Science Week for our students.

Very appropriately for Science Week twenty two of our Year 10 and 11 science students embarked on the 2019 NASA Space Camp Tour in the United States. The tour was led by Science teacher, Angela Zerbe, who together with teachers Jessica Franklin and John Davy travelled to the Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama. Twenty of our students did the Advanced Space Academy training experience, training up to undertake a simulated space mission at the end of the week. Two of our students opted for the 'Aviation Challenge' whereby they also trained up for a simulated jet fighter flight and experience. To add to the experience in the first week our tour group also visited the Bob Jones High School and a high school gridiron game held in front of a massive crowd. In the second week of the tour the group travelled to Florida and highlights included a visit to the Kennedy Space Centre, Disneyland and the Universal Film Studios. What a celebration of Science Week by Montmorency students!

Week two of this term was the last week of formal classes for our Year 12 students before their exams. On Tuesday 15th October they celebrated in style with their 'Name Day'. As Monty tradition has it, they each chose a theme resulting in a costume based on the first letter of either their first name or surname and the result was both entertaining and spectacular.

Recently we have two reasons to celebrate the wonderful achievements of our students. Firstly, Year 12 student Ben Stewart has achieved the Queen's Scout Award. Ben is a member of the 1st/2nd Greensborough Venturer Unit and to attain this prestigious award in each of the five Sections in Scouting reflects wonderful initiative in tackling this challenge, sustained effort over many years and a high level of self-discipline, teamwork and personal leadership. This has also entailed a lot of support and teamwork by Ben's scout leaders, his parents and his teachers. Ben's Senior School Leader, Deb Metcalfe and myself were fortunate enough to attend the presentation of this award at the Greensborough Scout Hall on the 18th September and we join our whole community in congratulating Ben.

NESPRESSO RECYCLING PROGRAM

For all coffee drinkers out there, Montmorency Secondary College has organised to be a collection point for Nespresso coffee capsules.

Unfortunately, domestic recycling systems in Australia are currently unable to effectively sort and recycle small items, such as aluminium coffee capsules so Nespresso has established its own recycling system for used capsules.

So don't throw your capsules in the rubbish, they can be dropped into the cardboard recycling bins at the General Office. This service is specifically for aluminium capsules only – no plastic.

Once collected, the used coffee is sent to an industrial composting facility to be transformed into compost. The aluminium is recycled and sent back to the aluminium industry to produce new products.

OPERATION NEWSTART—ENHANCE PROGRAM

Hi, my name is Michael Siede and recently I had the opportunity to attend the Enhance program run by Operation Newstart. Enhance is a leadership program for students attending school in the Northern Metropolitan area. The program focuses on engaging young people with their local community, gaining new life skills, exploring different styles of leadership and youth advocacy.

Enhance is a program for students who have been recognised within their school as having positive leadership qualities and could use alternative experiences out of school to promote further personal growth. In doing so, the program aims to further develop student's leadership and communication skills, and encourages students to promote positive change within their school and local communities.

Over a period of five weeks, I had the opportunity to take part in the program and during that time I was paired with eight other students from the northern district. I had a really great time experiencing new activities and developing new leadership skills. Some of the activities involved bike rides, tree top surfing, cross country skiing and a three day snowboarding trip to Mount Buller. However, during our time in the program we also discovered the four roles of



leadership. Being an active follower, peer leadership, designated leadership and self leadership. Learning about these leadership skills has taught me to become a more active and engaged member of the school and wider community.

Overall, I would recommend this program for any student who wants to challenge themselves and develop a new set of leadership skills that they can take back with them into the classroom.


Coming in 2020


SWAP SHOP Thursday 5th December, 2019

As in previous years, the procedure will be as follows:

- A list of books which students will be able to buy and sell for the following year will be produced, along with suggested prices.
- A room will be provided for each year level where parents can buy books for the following year and sell books from the current year. It will be up to parents to negotiate prices with each other, based on the condition of the book.
- Parents will need to ensure that they buy the current edition (as advised by the school) and that they have the correct money/ necessary change.
- Parents should note that this is a popular evening, and it is usually a case of first come, first served.

There will be no charge for this service, apart from the negotiated price of the books changing hands. Any unwanted/unsold current books can be donated to the school, for our Student Welfare Co-ordinator to distribute to students in need.



CHILDREN'S BOOK WEEK 2019

Late last term we celebrated Children's Book Week with a visit from author and illustrator, Martin Chatterton.

Martin is a successful children's writer/illustrator, adult fiction writer (Ed Chatterton), screenwriter, film-maker and designer with a PhD in Creative Writing.

Martin addressed all year 7 and 8 students with an engaging and interactive performance focussing on both his career as a writer and an illustrator. The sessions included insights into comedy writing, telling tall tales, 'beginnings', Martin's own writing and illustrating journey and how personal experience translates into different kinds of writing.

"COMING OUT is the process by which someone ...

- 1. Accepts and identifies with their gender identity and/or sexual orientation; and
- 2. Shares their identity willingly with others.

Some Fines We talk about coming out as if it were a one time thing. But for most folks coming out is a series of decisions – sometimes daily – that LGBTQ people navigate in every new setting they enter. (Most people aren't like Ellen, where they come out once and then the whole world knows.)

People may be "OUT" (> in some spaces, and "N" >) in others. +)/(> to Family +)/(> to Friends +)/(> to Classmates/Coworkers +)/(> to Religious Community A decision to come out to a person or group is one of safety, comfort, trust, \$ readiness.

It's dangerous, unhealthy, and unhelpful to force someone to come out, or to "out" someone else (i.e., disclosing someone's gender identity or sexual orientation to others without the person's consent), regardless of your intentions (sometimes people think they're being helpful, or acting on the person's behalf to conquer their fears), but...

IF SOMEONE COMES OUT TO YOU ...

- 1. Say "I always knew," or downplay the significance of their sharing with you.
 - 2. Go tell everyone, bragging about your "new trans friend."
 - 3. Forget that they are still the person you knew, befriended, or loved before.
 - 4. Ask probing questions, or cross personal barriers you wouldn't have crossed earlier.
 - 5. Assume you know why they came out to you.
 - 1. Know this is a sign of huge trust! (Yay!)
 - 2. Check-in on how confidential this is (Do other people know? Is this a secret?)
 - 3. Remember that their gender/sexuality is just one dimension (of many) of them.
 - 4. Show interest and curiosity about this part of them that they are sharing with you.
 - 5. Ask them how you can best support them.



MONTY INTERACTORS HELP FUND A TRAINING FACILITY IN NEPAL

Last May the Interact Club of Montmorency Secondary College held a community Dinner dance attended by Eltham Rotarians, staff, parents and VIP's The evening was a great success and raised \$4200 which was used to assist with the Eltham Rotary Club building project in Kathmandu Nepal. I led a team of 10 to begin building foundations for a teacher training facility for Global Action Nepal, a privately funded group of educators providing in-service training for teachers nation wide.

The team comprised of tradies and handy volunteers worked well alongside our Nepalese friends in trying conditions (the monsoon lingered) to erect the steel and concrete foundations as required by Nepalese earthquake proofing regulations.

However it was not all work. Time was taken to visit local schools and hand out stationary packs as well as female sanitary packs to a poor community. Team members also had time to buy tourist items in Thamel, the tourist hub, and spend a day exploring the ancient city of Baktapur, before the flight home after 16 days in country.

I will soon begin planning next year's trip and inviting a team to continue with the project and consolidate relationships with the two schools visited this year. The total commitment by Eltham Rotary Club so far is \$35,000 AUD. However this figure will need to be doubled to complete the three story structure. The Club is looking to raise the extra funds. Rebecca Catania, Montmorency Interactor Club's newly elected President will plan a fundraiser for 2020 to assist.

SNAKE ALERT

An urgent and important reminder to all students who travel to and from school using the Plenty River path or the sports ovals that they need to be aware tiger snakes are usually active at this time of the year, and that for the last eight years they have been very aggressive during hot weather. Environmental experts predict that snake sightings will become more prevalent this year. I have spoken to a field officer from the City of Banyule, and he said that short bursts of warm weather and sunshine resulted in snakes emerging from the scrub near the river and sunning themselves on paths and concrete surfaces. We have also had some Council warning signs installed near the river paths warning pedestrians to "Beware of Snakes".

In February some nine years ago one of our own students was bitten by a snake while walking near the river path at Simms Road Oval, and he spent a considerable amount of time in hospital. There are now warning signs along the path but all students and pedestrians need to exercise extreme caution when travelling to and from school along the river tracks. It is comforting to know that we have a great network of neighbours and pedestrians who use the river path and if there are any sightings of snakes they let the College know immediately.
